From the University of Texas at Austin, he earned an MEd in Curriculum & Instruction and a PhD in Philosophy with a dissertation titled *Plato's Ideal Education: From Elenchus to Psychagogia*. Recently, he earned a second PhD in Higher Education Policy and Leadership from the University of Melbourne, Australia, with a dissertation titled *The Challenges of Academic Leadership in Korean Higher Education*. His current academic and practical interest lies in higher education in general, in preserving the humanistic values in higher education curriculum in particular.

Kungang Li is now a full professor of Law School of Anhui University, a labor law expert in China. Professor Li worked as a visiting Scholar in University of California (Santa Barbara) from December in 2013 to December 2014, and in Law School of University of Melbourne from September to November in 2013. Professor earned a Ph.D in Law in Law School of Renmin University in Chinese legal history, with a dissertation titled *A Research on the Crimes concerning Salt in Qing Dynasty*. Professor Kimiko Osawa is currently Assistant Professor at East Asia International College, Yonsei University, Korea.

Prof. Osawa's educational background contains experiences at both Japanese and American institutions. After attending Keio University in Japan for two years, she transferred to Smith College (USA) where she received BA degree from the Department of Government. After graduation from Smith College, Prof. Osawa went back to Japan and completed her MA degree in Public Administration at International Christian University. Prof. Osawa then received her PhD degree in 2011 from the Department of Political Science at the University of Wisconsin-Madison (USA).

Prof. Osawa's research and teaching interests lie in Japanese politics and gender politics. More specifically, she is interested in the construction of gender norms and effects of such norms on people's lives. She is also interested in the roles of ideologies in politics, in particular conservative and nationalist ideologies.
